

York Residential Trip

Lower Prep pupils enjoyed a one-night residential visit to York on Tuesday 4 June.

SoundSpace was an audio-filled exhibit explaining the functionality of the human ear. I learnt that like bats, humans have a small sense of echolocation. They also can use both ears and differentiate which ear the sound waves are entering from. Another thing I learned was the genre of music from different areas.

SPARK was a digital, interactive and interesting section all about technology. It used pressure and light sensors to conduct really cool displays. I learnt how sensors function and how they can display different images depending on where you were positioned.




Year 7 and 12 Visit to Whitby
